

Q5. Advice to your juniors before entering Korea

Q6. Recommended places in Korea and Cheongju



The only thing I do not enjoy that much is that a lot of food tends to be more on the sweet side.




Q8. What is the most memorable event during exchange student programs? Or what event do you recommend?
